have an amazing range of great businesses. I hope people check out the local businesses between now and Christmas, find out what our local communities have to offer, and do their Christmas shopping within



The Canadian Pacific (CP) Holiday Train will make stops in Virden, Moo-somin, Broadview and Indian Head on Monday, December 5. The train will roll into Virden at 10:15

am that day, the stop in Moosomin at 11:55, Broadview at 1:45, and Indian

Head at 4:05 pm.

This marks the first visit by the train since 2018, as the Holiday Train was cancelled for the last two years due to Covid

The Holiday Train's visit will feature performances by country singer Tenille Townes and Oji-Cree perfomer Aysanbee. In Moosomin, food will be collected for

the Moosmin Food Share at the Holi-day Train's Moosomin stop. The Holiday Train's visit to Moosomin will cap off sev-eral days of Christmas events.

The Chamber of Commerce Moonlight Madness is set for Thursday, December 1. Santa Day, featuring photos with Santa and a free Christmas matinee movie for the kids at the Moosomin Community

the kids at the Moosomin Community Theatre, will be Saturday, December 3. A second Holiday Train that takes a route through the U.S. will also be mak-ing stops in North Porta, Estevan and Weyburn on Sunday, December 18. The train will stop in North Portal at 11:45 am that day, Estevan at 3 pm and Weyburn

at 5:45 pm.

The U.S. train will feature performances by Alan Doyle and Kelly Prescott.

This will be the holiday train's first

ross-continent tour in three years, following virtual concerts in the pandemic years of 2020 and 2021. The train will again raise money, food and awareness for local food banks in communities along the CP network.

# **STARS** appreciative of **Moosomin fundraiser**

A fundraiser in the community of Moosomin raised a total of \$3,382 for STARS Air Ambulance in Saskatchewan on October 23, at the Moosomin Community Theatre.

Organized by Mary Mc-Gonigal of Moosomin, the event had Rory Allen, a professional entertainer, perform a solo-show in tribute to Elvis.

Aside from the event being an opportunity for the community to enjoy, Mc-Gonigal said she organized it to help contribute to a good cause.

"When you put some-thing on, you expect it's going to go well and Rory Allen is so well received that we had a full house," she said.

"I just knew there would be profits and what would I do with them? I'm just an individual, I didn't do it for my own financial gain so I thought why not give it to STARS because that could help anyone and everyone.

McGonigal took a trip to Regina last Wednesday to donate the proceeds raised from the show. During her visit she was informed that STARS had been to Moosomin 17 times since April, and that they had made a few emergency trips to Rocanville, Kipling since the beginning of this year.

"We never know when we're going to be the ones needing it, we hope we don't, but if we do it's good to know it's there," said McGonigal.

Being a sold-out event, McGonigal was happy to see the number of people who came out, and for rais-

ing \$3,382.
"I was excited, as the week was going on I kept getting phone calls at home. I sold probably around 150 tickets just out of my house to people from all over, like Melville, Yorkton, Gainsborough, Melita, Virden," she said.

"I love doing these types of events. I was recovering from my knee surgery myself and putting on some-thing like this, it motivates you to keep doing it. I do it because I like doing it and it gives people something to go to, and I think people are so excited to be able to

finally go to a concert.
"I didn't know what I was going to raise, I have to put a non-refundable deposit down and of course I have to do advertising and other expenses. I just had to be willing to put that money out to cover the costs and am very happy that we were able to raise money for STARS."

STARS Air Ambulance in Saskatchewan relies on donations to cover 50 per cent of its funding to maintain its two bases in the prov-


"Here in the province of Saskatchewan it cost approximately \$21 million operate two bases for STARS, one in Regina and one in Saskatoon," said Jeri-Lynn Johnston, director of Donor Relations and Development of STARS Foundation, Saskatch-

"We're very fortunate that we do receive 50 per cent of our funding from the provincial government and we fundraise the additional 50 per cent. We fun-draise each and every year for around the \$10 and half million. We raise the funds

through a variety of ways.

"We rely on the com-munity as well, such as the event that took place in Moosomin over the week-end. We also do a lot of external fundraising initiatives that help support us in reaching our goals. We also have a corporate major donor program, where we have individual companies who support us on an annual basis

"The number of missions we fly and the cost being \$21 million to operate, having to raise that half is a pretty hefty amount, but it's because of groups throughout the community that help us in reaching that goal that allows it to be possible."

In every emergency trip STARS takes, there is always one registered nurse, a paramedic and two pilots in the helicopter.

Johnston was asked how big of a difference fund-raisers like the Rory Allen concert makes for STARS.

"It makes a huge difference, when you look at the amount of external support we receive from the communities, it has a big impact on us reaching our goals everyday and ensuring that we can be there for the next patient that needs us," she said.
"Because we've come

through a time where we had cancellations for a lot of the events due to the pandemic, to have these external events taking place in support of STARS means so much to us," she

"We're just really grateful for every dollar that we receive, everything from let's say a lemonade stand fundraiser, to an event that was put on in Moosomin. to major corporate partners, every dollar counts and helps in reaching our

Johnston said the \$3,382 that was raised from the event in Moosomin will go directly to STARS mis-



sions and operations in Saskatchewan

"On average we fly out two to three times a day in the province of Saskatch-ewan, those dollars will have immediate impact in ensuring that we can continue to carry out living saving missions here in the province," said Johnston. "Since 2012 when STARS

started in the province, we've flown over 200 missions in Moosomin and the surrounding area.

"All together in Sas katchewan since 2012, we're over 8,500 missions. I often see those mission stats that come in and we're in the Moosomin area quite often, 200 missions over the course of 10 years is quite a bit and we're glad that we're able to be there.

'We appreciate the funds that are raised to help us in continuing to do the work

"We often say at STARS

that STARS is built by the community for the com-munity, and these fund-raisers that take place are just a shining example of that being the case.

Members of STARS air nedical crew from Saskatchewan recently won the Association of Air Medical Services' (AAMS) on Oct. 26, at the Air Medical Transport Simulation Com-

petition in Tampa, Florida. Out of the nine teams from across North America, the duo won the SIM Cup for the 2022 Air Medi-Transport Simulation

Competition.

"The competition was intense," said Regina-based paramedic Chris Fay of

STARS Air Ambulance of Saskatchewan.

"This is the 17th time STARS has been going and we've always placed in the top three. There definitely was some pressure going down there, but it was a lot

"They put on a great competition and really push you, they had teams from all over North America competing, which can be a little intimidating realizing you're going up against teams from across North America."

Fay, a paramedic, and Regina-based nurse Kevin we compete amongst our-selves. Then the winner of that gets to go down there for the competition."

The competition started on Monday Oct. 24, where teams from North America had to complete preliminary scenarios on a big stage in front of a panel of judges, and a live AAMS audience.
The scenarios involved

working in real situations, while demonstrating skills that paramedics and nurses

that paramedics and nurses use on the job.

"There was two preliminary scenarios on the Monday, from there the top three teams get into the finals where they have to complete multiple scenarios from there," he said.

In the final scenario on the last day of the compe-

the last day of the compe tition, Easton and Fav had to navigate through a case

involving five patients.
"The first rule of SIM competition is that they're not going to do everyday basic things because everyone is good at that," Fay

"The rule is they're going to do something extravagant, an almost never going to happen type of case.
"This scenario was a car

accident that had two pa-tients in the vehicle who ended up striking a couple other people. In total there were five patients, one of them was pregnant with triplets, and there were also very distracting patients on the stage whose job was to be distracting, basically not following any sort of di-rection through the whole thing and yelling a lot.
"We had to deal with the

pregnant lady who was

very sick, then they just kept bringing in patients when you're sort of at your



# Sask has largest school enrollment growth in over 20 years

Saskatchewan's school divisions saw the largest enrollment growth for Saskatchewan schools in over 20 years with more than 189,900 students registered in provincial Kindergarten to Grade 12 school divisions, an increase of 3,840 students compared to last year. To support this growth, the Government of Saskatchewan will be providing an additional \$15.5 million in operating funding to the province's school divisions for the 2022-23 school year.

"The province is experiencing strong economic and population growth and our government is committed to ensuring that everyone in Saskatchewan benefits from this growth," Education Minister Dustin Duncan said. "That includes ensuring the school divisions have

said. "That includes ensuring the school divisions have the necessary funding to keep providing high-quality learning environments and supports to all students across the province."



A higher number of students new to Saskatchewan has increased the enrollment numbers significantly, including approximately 500 Ukrainian students enrolled through the Canada-Ukraine Authorization for Emergency Travel program. That number continues to grow. The latest family to arrive in Moosomin under the program are arriving today, and one new Ukrainian student will start school at MacLeod School next week.

week.

Enrollment funding is based on preliminary school division enrollment data collected by the Ministry of Education, which will be updated in December to reflect September 30, 2022, actual enrollment numbers.

This brings the operating budget to a record invest-

"They brought in a child who was vomiting, we had to manage their airway, then just as you're getting that figured out, they brought in an adult who was having dif-ficulty breathing, he had chest trauma so you had to deal with that.

"Then there was one other patient that we had to deal with. I think the theme of it was trying to overwhelm you with some critical patients and see how you do."

Fay said thanks to the training and sup-port from STARS, he and Easton felt pre-

pared for the competition.

"It was exciting. I still feel like a small Regina city boy who got to go represent North America, it was pretty cool," said

Fay.
"We felt well prepared, we have a great we felt wen prepared, we have a great education system here and we were well supported by our colleagues. We had bit of an entourage going down there with fellow nurses and paramedics and physicians to support us which was nice.

"We also did a lot of training here and a lot of scenario practice. At the end, it just shows that STARS is up there with all the other teams across North America, and with the quality of service we provide, that it holds true throughout.

"The really interesting part down there, that I took away from the whole experi-

ence, was the amount of respect STARS has from organizations that I would've thought had no idea who we are.

# **Harvest of Hope Growing project** raises \$70,000

"The Harvest of Hope is a Canadian Foodgrains Bank community growing proj-ect," said Kyle Penner organizer of Harvest

ect, said kyle Penner organizer of riarvest of Hope in Moosomin. "All of our proceeds of our grain today go to help feeding hungry people in Canada and other parts in the world."

This year, there were 33 Canadian Foodgrains Bank projects that covered approximately 3,500 acres in Saskatchewan.

Moosomin Harvest of Hope was the larg-

est growing project in Saskatchewan.
"I think it's important thing that we recognize our spot in the world as leaders in agriculture," Penner said.

'We've been really blessed with lots of great ground, with farmers who are fantastic at what they do, and the ability to share that

with people who can't, or who are less fortunate than we are."

On the day of the event, there were seven

volunteers who came out with their com-bines to help with harvest and 14 volunteers

to help throughout the day. However, Penner said there is about 40 to 50 volunteers who help with the growing project over the course of the year.

"That's one of the best parts about the community growing project is that we have so many people who are willing to get behind this cause," Penner said.
"There's people who participate, they're super generous for giving their time, and letting us use their pieces of equipment."
Penner said people from the community help out in different ways in support of the growing project.

"The committee consists of eight of us who


organize the project for the year, but within the community there's probably about 50 people that contribute on an annual basis in various ways," he said.

# Monument placed at Fort Ellice site to show historical contributions made by Métis people

LOCAL JOURNALISM INITIATIVE REPORTER To showcase the significant historical contributions of the Métis people of Canada, a monument was placed at the Fort Ellice site in southwest Manitoba on Oct. 18.

The community of St. Lazare, RM of Ellice-

Archie, and representatives of Métis Mani-toba Federation (MMF) and Nature Conservancy of Canada showed their support for the unveiling of the historical marking.

"This monument has been in progress for a long time and it's here today because of our elders," said Terry Haney president of Métis Manitoba Federation (MMF) Fort Ellice.

"It was Jacob Beads that built this Fort Ellice, he was a Métis carpenter. Our Métis, European ancestory, we would speak English, French, speak the Ojibwe language and

Michif language.
"We were scouts, we were guides, we traded at the forts where we would trade buffalo, and lots of our people were born here. Their birth certificates say Fort Ellice.

"Twenty-years ago the RM of Ellice-Archie and the councillors tried to expropriate this (site) as a resource site for families and it didn't go well, it started to cost a lot of money.

'Nature Conservancy of Canada bought it, they preserved the grassland and historical sites and the history behind it. It was a struggle, but we have our whole community

helping us to showcase our heritage.

"This is a big Métis community, St. Lazare started off with a mission, a Métis mission, and then it grew into a town and still today, the majority of the people are Métis. A lot of them are coming out now, but they wouldn't come out before because of the prejudice."

At the grand opening for the unveiling of the monument, Haney read out what the

monument states

The monument reads, "This monument is to commemorate the Métis people of Canada and their significant and historical contributions to the Fort Ellice and other forts across Western Canada.

"The Métis were scouts, guides, buffalo

hunters, translators who literally built Fort Ellice. Many were born here.

"May history never forget this Métis na-

The statement is also in the Michif lan-

guage and French on the stone. At the opening, a representative from MMF Southwest Region, Prairie Mountain RCMP and the principal of St. Lazare spoke about what the marking of the monument means for the community.

"Our history as Métis people hasn't al-ways been positive, but I would say in the last few decades here, things are starting to turn around," said Will Goodon, Minister of Housing and Property Management for MMF Southwest Region.

"I'm honored to be here. You look at this area here, it symbolizes when we were the power here on the Prairies, the Métis nation. We hunted, we traded, we had allies with the First Nations communities around here and

it was us. We carried the day around here.
"Then when things were bad, when Canada came and took our land and didn't complete its promises, there was that dark period and I think that's what we can see symbol-

But, now we see us coming out of that dark period where the Métis are proud. Our flag is everywhere, I love coming to St. Lazare and seeing the flag at the school, at the RM, everywhere we go.

"That pride is there, we don't have to hide anymore, we don't have to say we're not

"That this is our land, that we joined Con-

federation, we joined Canada and we are

years ago. He had this idea and once Terry gets a hold of something, he doesn't let go. I really appreciate that about him and him building all the networks necessary to make

ounting all the networks necessary to make this happen.

"Great to see the school here, great to see all the community folks here. Thank you again, I just appreciate being here with all my heart, and this monument is just the be-

"I know there's more coming down the pipe for Fort Ellice and the Manitoba Métis Federation will be there to support every step of the way. Thanks very much."

Students and teachers from École Saint-

Lazare attended the opening to show their support for the Métis marking.

"Fort Ellice was also a place that had an interest in agricultural activities, hunting, gardening, harvesting, and cattle and horse breeding were daily chores around the fort," said Richard Fiola, principal of École Saint-Lazare.

Today we add another point of interest for the visitors that come to the fort. For the past two years, the CDC P'tite Fourche has

been working on a touristic project.
"Next spring we will see kiosks installed all around the snow shoe trail on this site. We'll be having a special roundabout here for people to see. Next year when you come back for a visit, panels and metal sculptures of the history of Fort Ellice will be installed."

At the site, there are also two other monuments, a commemorative plaque that was placed by Hudson's Bay Company in 1930 to show respect for the history of Fort Ellice,

as well, as 14 healing Indigenous stones.
"We are now standing on the commemoration zone, it will be the welcoming zone right here. For the First Nations in the back,

you will see 14 stones which represent the 14 poles of a tipi," said Fiola. "That is part of the First Nation commemoration. We have in the back the caim that was placed in 1930 by Hudson's Bay Comhere in Fort Ellice.

"Today, we are unveilling the monument of the MMF. All together, Hudson's Bay, First Nations, and Métis people come together to-day for this opening ceremony.

"Thanks to you all for being here, and we're glad to part of the project with you all." Prairie Mountain RCMP also stated a few

"I can't say enough as to how much the community has opened up their arms and welcomed us to this part of our country," said S/Sgt. Matt Lavallee of Prairie Mountain RCMP.

"We're very proud to have myself and Brett Church involved in the reconciliation activities. I just want to say too, that I'm very pleased and proud that the RCMP is committed to moving forward with this initiative. "Together I think we can make a difference. Brett and I can't say enough how much

we want to thank you folks for having us down in your community. Thank you."

At the ceremony, Haney stated that the MMF Southwest Region has a strong part-nership with the council and municipality of RM of Fort-Ellice.

"I bring greetings from the municipality of Ellice-Archie," said Barry Lowes, Reeve of RM of Ellice-Archie.

RM of Ellice-Arche.

"I know I was involved in a meeting that was probably 20 years ago with this dream to try to make something happen up here. I commemorate with all the Métis federation, the CDC and the Nature Conservancy for their co-operation and it's finally coming to

# Sask to close liquor stores, auction off retail permits Retailers who sell their permits (through auctions or private transactions) are not required to disclose the selling

The government of Saskatchewan will complete the transition of liquor retailing to the private sector in 2023.

"With year over year declines in net revenue at SLGA re-tail, our government has made the decision to get out of the business of selling liquor," Minister Responsible for SLGA Lori Carr said. "We believe now is the time to complete the transition to the private sector to free up financial resources

transition to the private sector to free up financial resources for other priorities and to mitigate future losses."

In 2018-19, profits were \$9.4 million and in 2021-22, profits declined to \$3.2 million. SLGA Retail's projected net income for 2022-23 is \$395,000. In order to maintain profitability, many of SLGA's current stores need to be relocated or physically adapted to better meet customer needs, at a significant cost to taxpayers with no guarantee of recouping those costs.

Actual closing dates for stores will vary, with all stores being closed by March 31, 2023. Physical assets, including 19 buildings owned by SLGA, fixtures and equipment will be sold in a separate process.

The buildings in Moosomin and Esterhazy are owned by SLGA as the smill be sold.

SLGA will work with the Saskatchewan Government and

SLGA will work with the Saskatchewan Government and General Employees' Union (SGEU) to negotiate a workforce adjustment plan for affected employees.

The retail store permits associated with the 34 stores will be sold via a public online auction process beginning in early 2023. As per usual process, successful bidders must still qualify to hold a commercial liquor permit. Additional details about the auction process will be available later this year.

The closure will not impact SLGA's Distribution Centre. SLGA will continue to operate as the wholesaler of beverage alcohol for the province as well as the regulator of liquor, gaming and cannabis.

### Where are the 34 SLGA liquor stores located?

These 34 SLGA stores are located in 24 communities throughout the province, including Carlyle, Esterhazy, Estevan, Fort Qu'Appelle, Moosomin, Weyburn, and Yorkton

When will the stores close their doors? All stores will cease operations no later than March 31, 2023. Actual dates will vary depending on factors like lease dates, time required to decommission locations (larger stores will take longer than smaller stores), etc

# How many liquor retailers are there in Saskatchewan?

will any of these communities be without retail liquor service during this transition process?

There are approximately 600 liquor retailers operating in Saskatchewan (including the 34 SLGA stores). All the communities where SLGA stores are closing have at least one other liquor retailer currently operating (where customers can purchase alcohol for take home consumption).

# What happens to the SLGA employees at these stores? SLGA will negotiate a workforce adjustment plan with SGEU for employees affected by the closures. Generally speaking, employees will be eligible for severance and other transitional supports (will vary depending on position, years of service, etc).

What happens to the liquor store permits associated with the 34 stores that are closing?

The retail permits associated with the stores will be sold through a public online auction in early 2023. More details will be available later this year.

# Why use an auction process?

The online auction format is an objective method to determine a purchaser, giving interested individuals and busi-nesses the ability to follow and participate in the bid process in real time. Using online auctions is not new—this format has been used to sell permits previously. The successful bid-der must still apply and qualify to hold a commercial liquor How much have retail liquor permits sold for previ-

# Redvers Ag building new 6,000-square-foot Kubota dealership

A new 6,000-square-foot Kubota dealership is currently under con-struction in Redvers. The dealership is being built by Redvers Ag and is slated to be complete in the fall or early winter of 2023.

"Moosomin is one of 30 of these growing projects in Saskatchewan. They are small

communities, but they have a much big-

ger vision of what they could do in terms of having an impact in the wider world." Block was asked how a project like Moo-somin's helps make a difference to the Ca-

nadian Foodgrains Bank. "Very tangibly, very practically. There's a committee here, there's a leadership group that recognized years ago the need and a place where they were able to rent land," said Block.

land," said Block.
"They've been connecting with lots of Ag businesses in the Moosomin area. Being able to provide inputs that are often contributed as an in-kind donations by various companies. A lot of the Ag businesses are key partners in this.

"Another group that are key partners in this are those who farm. There's going to be someone who volunteers to put the seed in the ground in the beginning of the year one or two would volunteer to do the

year, one or two would volunteer to do the in-crop herbicide applications.

"In a way it often culminates at harvest because that's a time when you can get a lot of families that are eager to contribute to this project, some bring combines, some bring trucks, some bring grain carts, and it's really a fun way to cap off the growing

"In a couple weeks the rest of the group will hear some of the financial contributions because the grain goes into the bulk system. It's the financial value of that grain that is then forwarded to the committee and Canadian Foodgrains Bank.

"Essentially that money is utilized for our international projects and programs that go to alleviate hunger.

"There is a lot of need in the world right now dollars from this project."

now, dollars from this project, you can't pin point exactly, but there's a lot of response happening to a situation in Ukraine, both in Ukraine and on its borders, to the cur-rent situation in Pakistan in relation to the floods that happened. There's a large response in Eastern Africa because there is a large region with large populations on the cusp, and there's numerous other hot spots whether they're related to conflict.
"Also there's work that we do that's

very much upstream around helping small holder farmers learn how to become more food secure and resilient.

# Heavy rescue course deals with big wrecks

How do you pull someone out of a wreck when the vehicles involved are big—like semis, cement rollers, and school buses

That's what firefighters from around the region learned on the weekend of October 29 during a heavy rescue course hosted by the Redvers Fire Department.

Crews were asked to work through scenarios using real vehicles to extricate a number of dummies from vehicle wrecks. In one scenario a cement roller had crushed a mini van with a person trapped inside the van. In another a semi had toppled onto a vehicle, and crews had to cut through the back of the semi cab to get at the people inside the cab. In another a truck had hit a school bus, and the roof of the truck had to be peeled back in order to get the driver out.

The course was taught by Trans-Care Rescue, and included firefighters and rescue people from Redvers, Carnduff, Estevan, Carievale, Lampman, Indian Head, and the Mosaic Esterhazy mine.

Bill McCombs with Trans-Care Rescue says it's invalu-

able for rescue crews to learn how to do an extrication with real vehicles.

doing what you are doing, but then after that, the hands on training is invaluable," says McCombs. "Big heavy accidents like this happen. They don't happen very often, but when they do, everyone has to be in the game. You

new trucks there's a lot of electronics on them, so there are

a lot of safety issues that you have to deal with first.
"The structure of the steel is also a challenge. All these "The structure of the steel is also a challenge. All these new vehicles have boron steel which is extremely hard. And then you have all the safety systems like the air bags. Even on the semis you have air bags. And trying to work around the patient is a challenge too. A big part of this is learning how to work around the patient in real close quarters with very powerful equipment.

"The new vehicles protect people and they save a lot of lives, but they are all crash tested at around 50 to 60 km an

hour, and our accidents in Saskatchewan on highways and gravel roads are 100 to 120 km and hour. So even though they really do protect people, at those types of speeds it actually crushes a lot more.

"A big part of this too is actually reading what has happened to the metal. It's called reading the wreck. So you basically look at it and you can make some decisions based on the damage to the vehicle and where the people are—that versus what you have for equipment—and your knowledge and how you are going to get them out of there."
